My name is Nicole Honanie, my Hopi name is Pipwysie. I am Honwungwa (bear clan) originally from the village of Mishungnovi and reside in the village of Kykotsmovi.

I am excited to be returning home and joining the Hopi Foundation as the new HOYI Program Manager. My previous employment with Coconino Community College in the Financial Aid Office and the CCC Foundation Office has provided me with extensive knowledge of higher education, personal development, fundraising, and much more. The joy of helping people obtain their goals of obtaining an education or work skills is rewarding when you get to see them in the workforce doing what they love.

It has always been my goal to return home and work for my own people. There is so much potential out here among our people and we can each use some help with resources, information, and support. Our youth are our future leaders and its up to us to help them become the leaders they are meant to be. I am so grateful to be able to have this opportunity to help them as they journey into adulthood.

I hope to bring more insight and awareness to HOYI program. 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DATA UPDATE



HOYI has completed the first draft of the Language Assessment. As part of our work under the Cultural Well-Being pathway, in order to improve cultural and language attainment among our youth, we needed to understand and get a glimpse of the current status of youth's attainment to be able to meet them where they are and inform current and future programming in this area. Our first step was to understanding and educate ourselves in any prior research that was conducted in the community regarding language preservation. The Hopi Opportunity Youth Initiative conducted a language assessment to determine the factors that affect Hopi / Tewa language fluency.

With the help of funding resources from the First Nation's Development Institute's Native Youth and Culture Fund, HOYI launched the survey to our youth and hosted youth and stakeholder focus groups during the survey launch and post survey launch to leverage a deeper understanding of youth and community perspective on our research as a way to involve them in every step of our research. Our focus groups in the beginning of this work involved convening elders and youth to engage in conversation in the who, what, where, when and why of our youth and their access to learn the Hopi and Tewa languages. Hearing both perspectives, from youth and community, was interesting to learn that some comments contradicted each other, but was useful to inform this work moving forward and how programs can mitigate the perception of those comments.

A hopeful future is what the youths and young adults see and feel, but the disconnect and the barriers in place need to be addressed and mended before we can take those steps. We, the young people, can want it with everything we have but if we don't address the underlying issues and work together, it will not work (paraphrased sentiment). There are many barriers in place but our youth remain hopeful and ready to learn. As we move toward the end of 2021, we hope to have the final report to our partners and stakeholders.


